Nā Ha'awina Nui: (Main Lessons)

1. Pepeke Henua (time and place)

Pepeke Henua

- Used for asking and replying as to when or where something is.
 - Examples of asking:
 - When is the party?: Ahea ka pā'ina?
 - Where is the party?: Ma hea ka pā'ina?
 - Examples of replying:
 - The party is at this time.: Aia ka pā'ina ma kēia hola.
 - The party is over here.: Aia ka pā'ina ma 'ane'i.
- NOTE:
 - o Aia is always in the PO'O (beginning) of the sentence.
 - The PIKO is always the subject matter.
 - The 'AWE states where or when the subject occurs.
 - Use i or ma before stating the location or time. I or ma are interchangeable.
 - The PIKO and 'AWE can switch places

The box is on the shelf:

PO'O	PIKO	'AWE
Aia	ka pahu	ma ka hakakau
PO'O	'AWE	PIKO
Aia	ma ka hakakau	ka pahu

 Do not forget to use the ka'i before meme'a and 'o before I'oa (names of people or places).

Examples:

The boy is at the house:

PO'O	PIKO	'AWE
Aia	ke keiki kāne	i ka hale

She is in the room:

PO'O	PIKO	'AWE
Aia	'o ia	ma ka lumi

Kaleo is in the chair:

PO'O	PIKO 'AWE	
Aia	'o Kaleo	ma ka noho
